Intervention	Silk garments for dermatological conditions (such as eczema or dermatitis)
Date of Decision	June 2020
Date of Issue	July 2020
Recommendation	GREY- not recommended for routine prescribing in South East London.
Further Information	Silk garments are typically prescribed for eczema or dermatitis. These products are knitted, medical grade silk clothing which can be used as an adjunct to normal treatment for severe eczema and allergic skin conditions.
	 Silk garments are not recommended for the treatment of any of the dermatological conditions outlined in the South East London Area Prescribing Committee Community Dermatology Guidelines. Silk garments are included in the updated guidance from NHS England for low priority medicines that should not be routinely prescribed in Primary Care. The PrescQIPP document on silk garments states that the evidence relating to their use is weak and is of low quality.
	 An NIHR commissioned trial (CLOTHES) concluded that using silk garments for the management of eczema is unlikely to be cost-effective for the NHS.
	New patients: Do not initiate silk garments for any new patients, including in inpatient or outpatient settings.
	Existing patients: All patients currently receiving silk garments in primary care should be reviewed to facilitate deprescribing.

	If alternative therapy is required, then refer to the Community Dermatology Guidelines.
	Review any guidelines in the Trusts that recommend the use of silk garments in line with its amended formulary status and NHS England guidance.

Cost Impact for agreed patient group	The total spend on silk garments between April 2019 - March 2020 across the 6 SEL boroughs was ~£58K.
