National findings	 MBBRACE 2024 – data from UK 2020-2022 Statistically significant increase in maternal death rate compared to 2017-2019 data (COVID deaths excluded) Thrombosis and Thromboembolism was the leading cause of maternal death during or up to six weeks after the end of pregnancy, then COVID, then cardiac disease and mental health. There remains an almost threefold difference in maternal mortality rates amongst women and birthing people from Black ethnicity compared to White women. There remains an almost two-fold difference amongst women and birthing people from Asian ethnicity.

Engagement and emerging themes

Healthwatch Lambeth (Lambeth) Worked in partnership with 5 voluntary and community organisations.

Feedback from 55 women and birthing people. Black and Asian ethnicities, refugee and migrants, migrant health workers, living in areas of high deprivation and those with a learning disability Focus group discussions, one-to one interviews and written feedback

Feedback – highlights The importance of being kind, attentive and provision of responsive care Not to be ignored or dismissed Information, choice and control Better postnatal care and support Continuity of care Information and emotional needs support Creating Ground (Greenwich and Lewisham) Mum's Voices project Weekly sessions for migrants to explore birth experience through creative arts Surveys and one-to-one interviews, focus groups Topics included – individual circumstances that affect day to day lives, barriers to accessing maternity care, how health services can build rust with communities, and how to reduce barriers

Feedback – highlights Lack of support network Lack of knowledge about UK maternity services Immigration issues Language barriers Lack of consistency in staff Lack of consistency in treatment Lack of care/empathy Fear of payments and reporting to the home office Fear of disclosing mental health difficulties Racism and labelling Lack of postnatal support

Healthwatch Greenwich(Greenwich, Lewisham, Bexley and Lambeth)

Peer research model to understand the experience of migrant and asylum-seeking women and birthing people in SEL Peer researcher interviews – 24 women and birthing people

Feedback – highlights

Importance of quality of care Perception of maternity care – high expectations Access and information barriers Need for good postnatal care Need for support networks Need for cultural sensitivity East of England Local Government Association Open Dialogues Workshops with different community groups In collaboration with Black, Asian, ethnic minority groups and health professionals (SEL Midwives, Gypsy traveler and nomadic communities, Refugees and asylum-seeking people, Muslim women, Neurodiversity, LGBTQ+ people)

Feedback – highlights Information pack specifically for traveller, gypsy and nomadic communities Lack of contraception advice Difficulties of living in temporary accommodation, lack of facilities Lack of interpreter services/communication issues Lack of information about services and choices Grief around current conflicts and effect on families

Cultural awareness is important – male healthcare professionals
