Primary Care pathology activity relating to October 5 go-live

Q What is happening and why?

A Owing to the amalgamation over time of various pathology services, there are now multiple different IT systems and analytical instruments in use across south east London. By consolidating these IT systems and replacing aged analysers, GP practices will see improvements in efficiency and resilience to pathology services. Reducing non-urgent pathology activity will support Synnovis during the transition period.

Q How do these changes impact GP practices?

A There are three activities taking place on or around October 5 which will impact GP practices. These are:

Diverting resources or appointments during this window for other activity such as cervical smears or vaccinations. Urgent samples will continue to be processed and there are some community and urgent services which will continue as normal.
